

Naturescaping Planning Worksheet

Adapt this worksheet as needed to be relevant to your site, including adding more information if desired.

(If you have multiple sites, or parts to your project, you can # or Name them and use the entire worksheet for each of them by noting that number or name below)

- 1. What are your overall priorities and goals for the site of concern?
- Describe and document your chosen project site. Consider the size of the space and any constraints (using the <u>measurement resources</u> if necessary). Map out your details about existing infrastructure, planned new infrastructure, existing vegetation to stay or go, etc.

Remember to note and document the **sun exposure** at this site in midsummer and the **soil composition/texture**.

- 3. Begin cataloging your design goals/objectives, both functional and aesthetic.
- 4. What are the **primary site challenges** you hope to overcome?
- 5. What are the **secondary** challenges you're facing on the site in question (or in context with the rest of the site)?
- 6. **Phases:** Completely changing your home landscape is a large task, and can be overwhelming to take on all at once. We recommend breaking your project into phases! By breaking your project into phases, it is much more feasible and easier to maintain momentum to follow through with your project until it is finished.

Map out for yourself a few of the phases you plan to take for your project. Note: This is different from priorities in that there may be some phases that need to happen before fulfilling a priority (e.g., sheet mulching, dealing with critical issues like drainage or erosion, or the need for access for large equipment or materials prior to plants that might close that access).

7. **Layout:** Map out the configuration of your pathways, planting beds, entertaining space, play areas, etc. -- document your preferred layout options with the context of all your goals.

8. Hardscape options: If you're planning for hard paths or patios, what material choices are you considering? Remember you can phase this in, too, as budget permits (e.g. wood chip paths to start, maybe urbanite or pavers later; an urbanite wall for now, maybe a boulder wall later; etc.).
